178. Defence Cataloguing Authority contribution:

A probably little known fact is the spread of Ordnance persinto the byways of Defence HQ where their special talents fit them for tasks, often termed - for a better word - "back room jobs".

One of these by-ways is the newly formed Defence Cataloguing Authority now working under DEAM in Support Branch of the Ministry of Defence.

Several people had a look at the system some years ago when it was called the ABCSC system, but nothing really 'firmed up' until early 1969 when an exploratory team including Navy, Army and Air Force representatives visited the Australian DCA at Melbourne. Included in this team were Major Dick Edwards and Mr. Bill Smith (then a civilian but formerly OC of EDS). From the report this team submitted and from subsequent discussions and meetings the then PAO committee decided to adopt the NATO system into the NZ Defence Forces.

- 184. A New Supply Depot for Aldershot; an extract from the RAOC Gazette.

The DOS UK opened the new Command Supply Depot at Aldershot on 15 May 1970.

The new supply depot has been designed for maximum use of mechanical equipment and palletisation. The combination of stacking to eighteen feet and the handling of fast-moving food supplies for NAAFI elements requires continuous planning activity from the Depot Commander and his staff. There are also interesting exercises in the choice between free stacked pallet loads, unit loads, post pallets and racking, according to the nature and size of the packaging. Also included in the complex is a storehouse for lubricating oils and a full scale petrol station on civilian lines, serving civgas and dieso from three tanks and six dispensing points.

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Architecturally the construction is most striking and modern and the design has been entered in the design award scheme. As the DOS remarked ! It is a satisfying milestone for the Corps to receive its first purpose built supply depot. It was appreciated that the planning staffs, architects and builders had produced an effective and stimulating structure, where the Corps can maintain its long history of service in Aldershot.

This cortainly seems a step forward and we wonder if it could happen here? / 185.
