Request to O. i/c A. on behalf of B.O.D. for extra men for stores, ammn. work etc. D.A.A.G. advised that establishment for armourers now amended to permit one staff/sergt armpurer (replacing one sergeant) armourer, at D.O.W. B.O.D. report textiles mildewed and metal goods rusted through inadequacy of cover. (construction of shelters proceeding.) S.O.M.E. (M.T.) visited Heavy Coast W/Shops. In L.A.Ds and Workshops generally men employed on maintenance and construction duties.</p>

In D.O.W. considerable number of promotions to rank of Corporal and above. This applied particularly to vehicles using the ford and he recommended that it be put out of bounds to M.T. In connection with arms and equipment return for 3-Div units sent to Army H.Q. the following comment appears: "From now on the practice to be followed in this force will be that units when under strength in personnel will NOT hold rifles or pistols surplus to their their requirements at the time. Surplus rifles etc will be vouchered back to the B.O.D. and issued to reinforcements from there." (Ref DOS 9/5/1537). <u>SOME (ARMY)</u> advised D.A.A.G. of proposed allocation to units of new armourers from N.Z. (11) In 28 H.A.A. Workshops men given normal whole days training in small arms and general infantry work. Routine work in all other units.	
	11	-	Advice from Army H.Q. in response to inquiry, states that supply of spare parts for Tanks etc. are automatic. <u>DOW</u> advised by <u>SOME(MT)</u> that two recovery sections are to be attached to their respective brigades immediately. 28th H.A.A. W/Shops send two men to 204 Bty Ile Nou to adjust instruments, etc. <u>D.A.D.O.S.</u> on northern visit inspected 37 L.A.D. 64 L.A.D. (with 8 Inf Bde) moved to near BOLOUPARI en route to OUAMENI. Routine work in units. Party from <u>B.O.W.</u> erecting trig. stations for checking range-finders.	
	12		Number of promotions published for Base Ordnance personnel. S/Sgt. Rollo promoted W.O.-1 w.e.f. 13 Jany. NECAL.	13	-	O.C. <u>37 L.A.D.</u> reported that with O.M.E. 14 Bde he had inspected the Carriers of the 30 Bn and found them in "very good" condition. Normal work in most areas in morning; sports in some cases in the afternoon.	
	14	-	Sunday - Units at church parade in some instances; only urgent work on areas.	
	15	-	Two Higgins landing boats taken on charge by 8 & 14 Bdes. Units instructed to indent on DADOS for camouflage paint for tents. Returns required from units of shirts that have been mutilated by having sleeves shortened, and also census of cans 2-gallon, and drums 4-gallon, held by units. Twelve carpenters from <u>D.O.W.</u> engaged at <u>B.O.D.</u> in erecting shelving, bins, etc for M.T. section. <u>65 L.A.D.</u> started to erect grease ramp (with aid of 23 Fd Coy personnel). 	20	-	Working party from 15 Bde for erection of shelters at <u>B.O.D.</u> appointed for an extra $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 weeks as there still remains much work to be done. B.O.D. personnel engaged in sports meeting (Saturday) D.O.W. report Armament and instrument huts occupied. Work proceeding on Bofors 40mm. equipment Reconditioning of 25-pr guns drawn from U.S. army. Personnel of 28 Hy A.A. W/Shops instructed in use of gas equipment, also warned against dangers of fire in camp area. 67 L.A.D. constructed hot water boiler for 3 Div Sigs (formation attached to) Routine work in morning for most units; some sports, etc. in afternoon.	
	21	-	Advice from Deputy-Judge-Advocate-General (DJAG) that O.Cs pf L.A.Ds and Lt, Heavy and Coast Workshops should possess the powers of a Coy Comdr.,, but that for disciplinary purposes the C.O. should be declared to be the C.O. of the nearest infantry battalion or artillery regt. Normal Sunday routine for majority of units. D.O.W. reports reorganising of vehicles parked for repair, to facilitate servicing. Machinery of D.O.W. is at full pressure to keep up with machine shop work arising from M.T. repains.	
	22	-	Two Privates from D.O.W. selected by <u>SOME (Armt)</u> for training as armourers, locally. Noted that Wireless Section at D.O.W. was not being used because units were not aware of its work and existence. Suggested that typewriter mechanic at Base would be better placed in D.O.W. where there are more facilities for his work. <u>D.A.D.O.S.</u> at Base Ordnance Depot. Camp construction and stores erection continuing. At D.O.W. panelbeaters fully engaged on repairs to smash work. Application made for E.D. pay for unit. 28 Hy AA W/Shops inspected by DADOS. Two members of this unit left for D.O.W. for course of instruction to instrument artificers at D.O.W. 37 L.A.D. report work still rolling in, held up by lack of spares. Four O/Rs of <u>67 L.A.D.</u> started course of intensive training with 3 Div Sigs. Normal workshop and area routine for units generally.

NECAL.	23	-	Army H.Q. advise that 20 telescopes, observation being despatched for use of battalions. Officer i/c Admin, Base advises that 8000 American bedcots are available at Noumea for 3-Div. O.C., B.O.D. advises that they are still awaiting the loan of a bulldozer to assist in work of clearing the hill and complete roading. In D.O.W. only camp maintenance and routine shop work, as in 28 H.A.A. W/Shops, xxxx , and other units, incl. L.A.Ds.	
	24	-	O.C., B.O.D., advises that no waterproof capes available for issue. Recent shipment of 500 had been taken up with fulfilling unit orders to complete Divisional units' issues. Capt. Romaine of M.T. Branch of Army H.Q. visited B.O.D., with S.O.M.E.(MT) and conferred with C.O.O., and O.C., M.T. section, B.O.D. O.C., B.O.D. advises that tentage so far received by the B.O.D. from N.Z. is: I.P. tents, 1278, I.P.P., 135, Marquees G.S. 4; tarpaulins, 486, plus a few small items. These figures do not take account of those brought by units. S.O.M.E.(Armt) also visited B.O.D. Capt. Romaine also visited Hy Coast Workshops. Personnel of 28 Hy AA W/Shops engaged in military training, all day, range practice, etc. Two sergeants posted to 65 L.A.D. from 64 L.A.D., both units being short of personnel.	
	25	-	E.D. pay granted for clerks in 3-Div Ord. H.Q. w.e.f. date of commencement of duties in NeCal. In view of American forces provision of same, Officer i/c Admin is asked to inquire if N.Z. forces here require them also. Captain Romaine visited D.O.W.. W.O.-1 J.E. Piercy returned to D.O.W. xxxx from course of instruction conducted by him at 28 H.A.A. W/Shops.	
	26	-	D.O.W. report that machinery wagon fully occupied in machinery work. Routine maintenance work in all workshop sections and L.A.Ds. 37 L.A.D. very busy on welding.

NECAL.	28.	-	<p>General comments for month:</p> <p>O.C., <u>28</u> Heavy Coast Workshops, stated that morale of men has been good, although hours long and work tedious, and little spare time available. Weekends were filled with maintenance. Considers would require above establishment to carry out work required by vehicles in area...</p> <p>O.C., <u>29</u> L.A.A. Workshops section reports that his month's work has been mainly the repair of motor vehicles, guns and gun equipment. Unit is short of personnel, making it impracticable to carry out routine inspections. General condition of the roads <u>has</u> greatly increased the work to be done on motor vehicles beyond the scope of the 5 mechanics. He reports that unit is seriously short of gun artificers, with no man suitable for training.</p> <p>O.C., <u>20</u> L.A.D. sums up operations by stating that general condition of roads makes light vehicles unserviceable.. With heavy rain, vehicles <u>in</u> daily use should be greased daily, not on mileage basis.</p> <p>O.C., <u>64</u> L.A.D. notes that his unit is five short of establishment, and seriously handicapped by absence of stores truck still in N.Z. also lack of breakdown truck. Supply of parts has been a difficulty, also of gas for welding, the latter being especially important when parts have to be repaired owing to scarcity of replacements.. Suggests portable electric welding plants would ease the position.</p> <p>Shortage of parts and personnel are two common complaints from technical units. Building has gone on through the month in a number of units, particularly in <u>Base Ordnance Depot</u>, where provision of shelters for stores has been of particular importance.</p> <p style="text-align: right;"><i>missey</i> Lt.-Col., D.A.D.O.S.</p>
